Your guide to in-person activities

Learn about how in-person activities work and what you can do to get involved as a volunteer.

What's an in-person activity?

In-person activities allow volunteers to visit schools directly and engage with children and young people face-to-face. It's a fantastic way to build connections with your local community.

These mostly take place during the school day, 9.00am to 3.30pm. Depending on the type of activity, it may take place in an assembly hall or classroom and could involve small groups or multiple classes.

In-person activities will typically last around 1 hour, with additional time for a brief before and de-brief after the session.

Getting involved

In-person activities are the core of what we do and so the default for all volunteers is that you can be invited to in-person sessions.

When a teacher organises an in-person session, they will invite volunteers using the map function as this will only show them the profiles of volunteers in their local area. The map uses the postcodes you added when you set up your profile.

You can also express interest in in-person activities. Watch this <u>short video</u> on how to express interest and remember that you can move around the map to search in areas convenient to you.

How do I prepare for an In-person activity?

Use our 'In-person activities checklist' to make sure you've covered all you'll need to be ready for your in-person activity.

Going into school

Practicalities

- In your communication before the activity, the teacher will share practical information with you
 about coming to school which will usually include expected arrival time and parking or entry
 arrangements.
- If you have any access needs for attending in-person, discuss these with the teacher in advance of your activity.
- Ensure you give yourself lots of travel time, especially if you haven't been to the school before.



In-person activity checklist

You're going to an in-person activity, so you'll be travelling to school to join an interactive activity and share your career story to inspire young people. Read through the checklist below to make sure you're ready ahead of your activity.

For the activity

Communicate with the teacher coordinating the activity.

Make sure you know what is expected of you including the session's format and aims. You can use the chat function on the portal, or they may also ask to contact you by email or phone.

Prepare following the brief from the teacher.

Each activity will be different but most focus on talking about yourself and your career journey, so preparation is usually minimal. Depending on the instructions from the teacher, you may also need to prepare a short presentation or bring along a prop.

Use the guide for your type of activity.

Under the information guides on the portal, you'll find a guide for each type of activity, including what to expect and advice on how to prepare.

Make sure your content is adapted to your audience.

Once you've asked teacher the age range of the children or young people, you can adapt your language and content to be age appropriate. <u>Watch this webinar</u> or use the resources on the portal for more on communicating with young people.

Send your presentation or materials over in advance.

This allows teachers to double-check content and avoid technical issues on the day.

For the day

Arrange the time off work to attend.

You can remind your colleagues you'll be out of office and add the event to your calendar. Don't forgot to add in travelling time!

Plan your journey to the school.

Make sure you know how long it will take and the best travel route to get there. We recommend adding a few extra minutes to allow for signing in and being accompanied from reception.

Brush up on our safeguarding policy.

You'll find more on safeguarding and our volunteer code of conduct in your volunteer handbook.

Note the contact Information for the teacher and school. This is important to have in case you need to reach them on the day of the activity.

Volunteering Activities



What's the approximate time commitment?...

- 5-8 hours a month
- Usually, a 2+ hour meeting every half-term (6 in a year). These are usually in the early evening.
- Preparatory reading of board papers for these
- Possibly a visioning day/ governor walk day during the year

Then...depending on your confidence/ capacity...

- Recruitment
- Exclusion panels
- Headteacher performance review
- Vice Chair/ Chair/ Safeguarding/ committees/ etc.
