

MARITIME PARLIAMENTARY BULLETIN

W/C 11 January 2021

The purpose of this bulletin is to update MPs and Peers on the latest developments in the UK maritime sector, and to provide a forward look to opportunities within parliamentary business for positive advocacy.

Recent developments and events

- Maritime UK is pleased to confirm the appointment of Sarah Kenny as its new Chair, and of Robin Mortimer as its new Vice Chair. Kenny, who is CEO of BMT Group was previously Vice Chair and replaces Harry Theochari, Global Head of Transport at Norton Rose Fulbright. Kenny's successor as Vice Chair Robin Mortimer is CEO of the Port of London Authority. Harry Theochari served as Chair from 2018 and has overseen the work of Maritime UK through a time of rapid change and new challenges for the sector, including the UK's exit from the European Union, work to decarbonise the sector, focus on coastal communities and finally the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Kenny and Mortimer started their terms as Chair and Vice Chair on 1 January 2021 and will be working with members to help steer the sector through the next four years having left the European Union, as it seeks to build back better from COVID-19, attract new investment and accelerates its work to meet its net zero commitments with the key COP26 summit being held in the UK in 2021. - The UK's maritime sector including its ports have done a magnificent job through the pandemic keeping supply chains moving, whilst facing challenges related to the impact of Covid-19 on the ability of colleagues. Acknowledging the pressures on vaccination abilities, the sector is urgently discussing with government the potential for prioritising workers in key functions for the movement of goods, as well as the need for an interim protocol on more rapid and frequent testing.
- The cruise industry, through the UK Chamber of Shipping and CLIA, has worked for several months to agree health protocols that go beyond other travel sectors operating today, including aviation. The industry's ask remains the same: clarity to enable planning for the operational restart of cruise ships, which could take up to three months. In practical terms this means rescinding travel advice specific to cruise in order to build consumer confiedence for sailing in 2021. Ministers must recognise the urgency of the challenge on

behalf of the tens of thousands of people whose jobs depend on a successful UK cruise industry.

Lords

The following oral questions in the House of Lords represent opportunities for maritime to be raised:

- 25 Jan Oral question: How many of the new ship orders highlighted by the PM in his announcement about defence spending have been ordered.
- 1 Feb Oral question: Impact of the end of the Brexit transition period on the logistics industry in the UK.

We would be delighted if parliamentarians would be willing to table requests for parliamentary debates on the UK maritime industry, and we can support with suggestions for these.

The maritime industry - key messages

- Maritime contributes £46.1bn to the UK economy and supports 1 million jobs (more than air and rail combined).
- Maritime is responsible for keeping the country supplied (resilience): 95 percent of British imports and exports in goods are moved by sea, including 25 percent of the UK's energy supply and 48 percent of food supplies. Investment is essential for maintaining these resilient supply chains that every constituent relies upon.

- Ports invest over £600m of private capital each year, benefiting coastal economies through
 job creation and infrastructure investment.
- Maritime workers are 43% more productive than UK average.
- Maritime is a source of well-paid highly skilled roles, which pay an average of £38,000 per year - £9,000 more than the national average.
- Globally, the maritime sector will double to \$3trn by 2030.
- Maritime makes a significant contribution to all nations and regions of the United Kingdom.

Maritime UK's priorities for the year ahead

Over the coming year, Maritime UK intends to focus on the following priorities, both by engaging with the UK maritime industry, and by working constructively with the Government and other political stakeholders:

- Supporting maritime businesses and the UK maritime industry through Brexit changes, as
 well as maximising the opportunites that arise from the UK once again becoming an
 independent trading nation.
- Boosting the export and international trade potential of UK maritime and improving the competetiveness of the UK's business environment to attract maritime businesses.
- Delivering regional growth through Maritime UK's Regional Cluster Development Plans in a way that aligns with the Government's wider levelling-up agenda.
- Demonstrating the benefits (both environmental and economic) of maritime
 decarbonisation ahead of the COP26 UN Climate Conference taking place in the UK this
 year, with a particular focus on innovation Maritime UK will be working with the
 Government to ensure that funding allocated for maritime decarbonisation is effectively
 utilised.

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
