

## MARITIME PARLIAMENTARY BULLETIN

## W/C 31 May 2021

The purpose of this bulletin is to update MPs and Peers on the latest developments in the UK maritime sector, and to provide a forward look to opportunities within parliamentary business for positive advocacy.

## Recent developments and events

- Maritime UK at G7: Maritime UK and members will be using the G7 taking place in Cornwall
  next week as an opportunity to promote the sector's interests on both the international and
  domestic level around decarbonisation. A report will be produced which puts the UK's
  efforts to decarbonise the sector in the context of other G7 countries. This report will be
  shared with Parliamentarians.
- Maritime 2050 Conference 25 June 2021: Maritime UK, in partnership with Mersey Maritime and the Department for Transport, are organising a national Maritime 2050 conference, held in Merseyside. Set to take place on 25 June, Day of the Seafarer, the event will aim to explore the key themes within the government's Maritime 2050 strategy and celebrate successes, but also identify gaps in delivery and set out next steps for future progress. - June is Pride Month: Maritime UK will be celebrating Pride Month in June through different events as part of the Diversity in Maritime Programme, including a meeting of the Pride in Maritime Network on 23 June, as well as a high-level industry roundtable where senior leaders from across the maritime sector will meet to discuss how to make maritime a welcoming place for LGBT+ employees. - Maritime 2050 conference (25 June): Following the current audit looking at the progress of recommendations set out within the Maritime 2050 strategy and identifying gaps in delivery, Maritime UK will be organising a Maritime 2050 conference on 25 June, the Day of the Seafarer. Register here.
- London International Shipping Week 2021 (13 17 September): It is once again time for the bi-annual London International Shipping Week, the largest event on the maritime calendar. Maritime UK is planning a range of activity across the week, including a regional showcase, a parliamentary reception, a green technology showcase, career events aimed at children and young people, and high-level events such as a ministerial roundtable.
- COP26 (1 -12 November): The UN's climate conference is taking place in Glasgow this

# Upcoming Parliamentary opportunities to promote maritime

#### Commons

We would be delighted if MPs would be willing to use any opportunities at PMQs and Business of the House Questions to promote the UK maritime industry (these questions are drafted to be suitable as either oral or written parliamentary questions):

- PMQs Wednesdays: We would be delighted if MPs would be willing to raise maritime at PMQs if they are selected in the ballot, and happy to support in drafting a question
- 14 June Housing, Communities and Local Government questions To ask the Secretary
  of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, what analysis his department
  has conducted of the economic impact an investment in maritime decarbonisation would
  bring to coastal communities in the UK.
- 16 June Northern Ireland questions To ask the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, what discussions his department has held with the Treasury about investing in the Northern Ireland maritime industry to support decarbonisation.
- 22 June HM Treasury questions To ask the Chancellor of the Exchequer, what support the Treasury is providing to maritime SMEs.
- 23 June Scotland questions To ask the Secretary of State for Scotland, what
  discussions his department has held with the Treasury about investing in the Scottish
  maritime industry to support decarbonisation.
- 24 June Transport questions To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what support his department is providing to the maritime sector.

#### Lords

The following debate in the House of Lords represents an opportunity for maritime to be raised:

- 22 June Protecting human rights at sea
- 23 June Whether continuous at-sea deterrence remains the essence of the government's defence policy

We would be delighted if parliamentarians would be willing to table requests for parliamentary debates on the UK maritime industry, and we can support with suggestions for these.

## The maritime industry - key messages

- Maritime contributes £46.1bn to the UK economy and supports 1 million jobs (more than air and rail combined).
- Maritime is responsible for keeping the country supplied (resilience): 95 percent of British imports and exports in goods are moved by sea, including 25 percent of the UK's energy supply and 48 percent of food supplies. Investment is essential for maintaining these resilient supply chains that every constituent relies upon.
- Ports invest over £600m of private capital each year, benefiting coastal economies through
  job creation and infrastructure investment.
- Maritime workers are 43% more productive than UK average.
- Maritime is a source of well-paid highly skilled roles, which pay an average of £38,000 per year - £9,000 more than the national average.

- Globally, the maritime sector will double to \$3trn by 2030.
- Maritime makes a significant contribution to all nations and regions of the United Kingdom.

## Maritime UK's priorities for the year ahead

Over the coming year, Maritime UK intends to focus on the following priorities, both by engaging with the UK maritime industry, and by working constructively with the Government and other political stakeholders:

- Supporting maritime businesses and the UK maritime industry through Brexit changes, as
  well as maximising the opportunities that arise from the UK once again becoming an
  independent trading nation.
- Boosting the export and international trade potential of UK maritime and improving the competitivness of the UK's business environment to attract maritime businesses.
- Delivering regional growth through Maritime UK's Regional Cluster Development Plans in a way that aligns with the Government's wider levelling-up agenda.
- Demonstrating the benefits (both environmental and economic) of maritime
  decarbonisation ahead of the COP26 UN Climate Conference taking place in the UK this
  year, with a particular focus on innovation Maritime UK will be working with the
  Government to ensure that funding allocated for maritime decarbonisation is effectively
  utilised.
- Supporting and growing the workforce by continuing to develop our Diversity in Maritime
   Programme, our Careers and Outreach Programme, and our Maritime Skills Commission.
